Business licenses must be renewed yearly by June 30th.
Rental properties are licensed on a biennial basis from the date of your 1st application. They also require an inspection of the property be done with each renewal.

Home fires occur more in winter than in any other season.
As you stay cozy and warm this winter, be fire smart!

Half of all home heating fires occur in December, January and February

Heating equipment is involved in 1 in every 7 home fires & 1 in every 5 home fire deaths

Keep anything that can burn at least 3 feet from any heat source like fireplaces, wood stoves, radiators or space heaters

Keep portable generators outside away from windows, & as far from your home as possible

Install and test carbon monoxide alarms at least once a month

Plug only 1 heat-producing appliance (like a space heater) into an electrical outlet at a time

Have a qualified pro clean and inspect your chimney and vents every year

Store cooled ashes in a tightly covered metal container, & keep it outside at least 10 feet from your home & any nearby buildings

Snowplow crews rely on residents' help to place garbage,
recycling and yard waste carts behind the curb when it is trash

WINTER PARKING RESTRICTIONS

Parking restrictions are in effect and go until April 1st.

*****No Parking** allowed on City streets between the hours of 2 AM and
6 AM without an emergency parking permit issued by staff at City Hall.

*****No Parking** on any street after a snowfall with accumulations of
2 inches or more until all snow, ice and similar debris have been removed
from the paved portion of the street.

***** It is illegal** to remove snow from private property and place
it on the road or sidewalk.

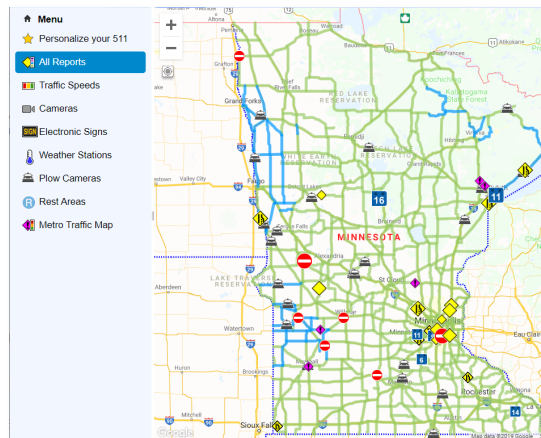
*****Approximately 200 accidents** occur each year involving snow
moving equipment, so be extra cautious and **always** give the plow truck the
benefit of the doubt. It weighs in excess of 50,000 lbs.

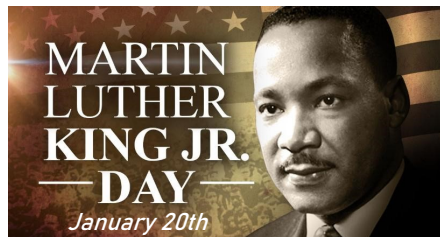

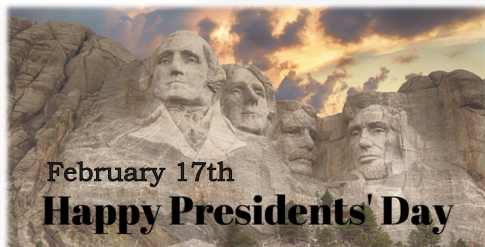

Chapter 10 Section 10.35 JUNK CARS, FURNITURE, HOUSEHOLD FURNISHINGS AND APPLIANCES STORED ON PUBLIC OR PRIVATE PROPERTY

It is unlawful to park or store any unlicensed, unregistered or inoperable motor vehicle, household furnishings or appliances, or parts and components thereof, on any property, public or private, unless housed within a lawfully erected building.

Any violation of this section is declared to be a nuisance and upon seven days written notice to the owner, as shown by the records in the office of the County Auditor, the private premises on which such material is found, the City may remove the same and certify the cost of such removal as any other special assessment.

Chapter 11 Section 11.60 Subd. 25. REQUIRING THE NUMBERING OF BUILDINGS

A. Numbers Assigned. The City shall assign distinctive street numbers to all principal buildings presently located within the City. Principal buildings hereafter constructed shall be assigned street number when the building permit is issued.

B. Numbering Required. It shall be the duty of the owner, agent, lessor or occupant of every house, mobile home or other building except barns, garages and other residential, commercial or industrial buildings which are part of the same property with a numbered house or building, to place on every such mobile home or building its proper street number in conformity with the following:

- 1) Arabic Numbers shall be posted above, on or beside the principal entrance to the building.
- 2) Numbers shall be posted in a manner as to be visible from the dedicated street on which the property is located.
- 3) Premises which are located so that they are not visible from the abutting street shall have an additional set of numbers located on a post, sign or other device, which is clearly visible from such street and which clearly designates the premises numbered.
- 4) Numbers must have a minimum height of 4 inches and a minimum width of 1-1/2 inches. Numbers must contrast with the color of background to which they are attached or must be made of a reflective material.
- 5) In cases where a principal building is occupied by more than one business or family dwelling unit each separate front entrance of such building shall bear a number, as assigned by the City.

Cut back on Road Salt to Protect Our Infrastructure, Water, and Aquatic Wildlife!

The Twin Cities Metro applies 350,000 tons of road salt every year, but have you ever wondered where it goes when winter ends? Stormwater and snowmelt carry dissolved road salt into lakes, streams, and groundwater when winter thaws out. Chloride, a major part of road salt compounds, is especially stubborn in water. Once it dissolves, there is no feasible method to remove chloride from water, and stormwater treatment solutions like stormwater ponds and rain gardens are ineffective at removing chloride. Instead, chloride gradually accumulates in our water bodies, harming fish and other aquatic life. The corrosive nature of road salt also contributes between \$350 million and \$1.2 billion in infrastructure costs each year to the Metro area alone.

What can you do about it?

Here are some helpful tips **you** can use to make your driveways and sidewalks safer and better for the environment this winter:

Shovel!

Salt is never a substitute for shoveling. Shovel your snow and ice first so that salt is only used for melting ice stuck to the ground.

Scatter!

Did you know you only need a 12-oz. mug of salt to effectively de-ice a 20-foot driveway or 10 sidewalk squares? When applying salt, aim to leave 3" between grains.

Salt!

Traditional salt (sodium chloride) does not melt ice when the temperature is below 15 degrees Fahrenheit. Use a low-temperature alternative such as magnesium chloride or calcium chloride to melt ice at lower temperatures or use sand for traction.

Sweep!

Sweeping up leftover salt and reusing it later is a great way to save money and limit the amount of salt getting into nearby waterways



The City has stakes available for residents to pick up. They can be used to mark curves along the roadway or other items that may be hit by the plow. Once the plow had gone by several times they will no longer be needed.
