## Do you own a Business or Rental Property in the City of Lexington?

City ordinance requires that all businesses & rental properties obtain a license to operate within the city limits.

Business licenses must be renewed yearly by June 30th. Rental properties are licensed on a biennial basis from the date of your 1st application. They also require an inspection of the property be done with each renewal.



#### Garbage Cart Placement

Snowplow crews rely on residents' help to place garbage, recycling and yard waste carts behind the curb when it is trash pick-up day. Carts placed in the street interfere with snowplowing operations. Crews are unable to plow the streets from curb-to-curb when carts are in the street. If trash / recycling pickup day coincides with plowing activities, make sure your trash can and recycling bin are well behind the curb or in the driveway so the plow & the snow pushed up from the plows will not hit them.

## Recycle SMART This Holiday Season

#### Do not place these in your recycling cart; take them to a drop-off location.



#### **Batteries and Battery Enclosed Electronics** (household and rechargeable)

Why: Batteries and electronics with non-removable batteries can explode and start fires if crushed or punctured. Every month garbage trucks and recycling facilities experience fires when batteries are improperly thrown away. Recycle: Batteries and some battery enclosed electronics, can be taken to the Anoka County Household Hazardous Waste (HHW) facility or select recycling centers and drop-off events. Go to AnokaCounty.us/HHW for location, hours and a list of accepted items. Go to AnokaCounty.us/RecyclingDirectory for other recycling locations.

#### **Tanglers**

are any item that get wrapped around sorting equipment at recycling facilities, such as plastic bags, holiday lights and electrical cords.

Why: These items become tangled on machinery and workers can spend hours each day removing them, causing costly processing delays.



#### Plastic Bags, Stretch Film and Air Pillows

Reduce/Reuse: Avoid using plastic bags by bringing your own bag. Bring packaging materials to mailing stores for reuse.

Recycle: Clean, dry bags and stretchy film can be taken to large retailers, grocery stores and recycling drop-off centers. Puncture plastic air pillows and recycle it with other plastic film. Look for collection containers by store entrances. Check the on-line Anoka County Recycling Directory for locations.

Trash: Throw away non-stretchy cellophane, black, wet or food contaminated bags and remove plastic handles.



#### **Holiday Lights and Cords**

**Recycle:** Many city halls and recycling centers collect these items for recycling. Go to AnokaCounty.us/RecyclingDirectory for locations.




#### **Food**
