Protect our Stormwaters

Pet Owners With the warm summer weather bringing more walks and romps to the park...and around the neighbor. please remember - by City Ordinanceit is required to clean up after your animal and keep them on a leash.

It might not seem like a stormwater problem, but animal waste is one of the many seemingly small sources of pollution that can add up to big problems for water quality, and even human health. Animal waste contains two main types of pollutants that harm local waters: nutrients and pathogens. When this waste ends up in water bodies, it decomposes, releasing nutrients that cause excessive growth of algae and weeds. This makes the water murky, green, smelly, and even unusable for swimming, boating, or fishing. The pathogens, disease causing bacteria and viruses, can also make local waters unswimmable and unfishable, and have caused severe illness in humans. As you can see, animal waste doesn't simply decompose. So, the easiest way to avoid these problems is to clean up after your pet each and every time, and dispose of the waste properly!

Snapshot of City Ordinances

CHAPTER 4 SECTION 4.02. BUILDING PERMIT REQUIRED.

It is unlawful for any person to erect, construct, enlarge, alter, repair, move, improve, remove, convert, or demolish any building or structure, or any part or portion thereof, including, but not limited to, the plumbing, electrical, ventilating, heating or air conditioning systems therein, or cause the same to be done, without first obtaining a separate building or mechanical permit for each such building, structure or mechanical components from the City.

CHAPTER 11 Subd. 4. Nuisances. No noise, odors, vibration, smoke, air pollution, liquid or solid wastes, heat, glare, dust, or other adverse influences shall be permitted that will in any way have an objectionable effect upon adjacent or nearby property.

A. Noise. It is unlawful to make, continue or cause to be made or continued, any noise in excess of the noise levels set forth unless such noise be reasonably necessary to the preservation of life, health, safety, or property.

B. Measurement of Noise. Any activity which creates or produces sound regardless of frequency exceeding the ambient noise levels at the property line of any property by more than six decibels above the ambient noise levels as designated in the following table, shall be a violation.

City of Lexington Ordinance Chapter 10 sect 10.40 subd 2

Recreational fires can only burn between 8:00 am and 2:00 am and no more than one recreational fire is allowed

on any property at one time. **Recreational Fire Site** an area of no more than a three (3) foot diameter circle (measured from the inside of the fire ring or border); completely surrounded by non-combustible and non-smoke or odor producing material, either of natural rock, cement, brick, tile or blocks or ferrous metal only and which area is depressed below ground, on the ground, or on a raised bed. Included are permanent outdoor wood burning fireplaces.

FACTS

July is the peak month for grill fires

45% of home grill fires escalate to structure fires that begin on either a patio, deck, open porch or exterior balconyRoughly half of the injuries involving grills are thermal burns

Remember that per city ordinance, Grills (Propane, Charcoal, Gas, Electric) Are **NOT ALLOWED** on apartment Decks or Patios

Fireworks Safety Tips

- ★ Never allow **children** to play with or ignite fireworks.
- ★ Never try to re-light or pick up fireworks that have not ignited fully.
- Keep a bucket of water or a garden hose handy in case of fire or other mishap.
- ★ Make sure fireworks are **legal** in your area before buying or using them.
- ★ Light fireworks one at a time, then move back quickly.

Recycle Smart – Bulky Plastics Are Not Recyclable!

It might be tempting to put that broken hamper in your curbside cart or bring your kid's old toy to the recycling center... it's plastic, so it's recyclable, right? Actually, that is NOT correct. Curbside programs are set up to sort plastic bottles, cups and containers #1, #2 and #5.

Large, bulky plastic items like children's toys, kiddie pools, lawn furniture, laundry hampers, plant pots, buckets and other plastic household items, are not meant for curbside recycling programs. Drop-off centers don't want them either. They ARE NOT recyclable.

If not damaged, consider reuse and donate these types of items. If damaged, contact your hauler before throwing away for more details and to see if there is a charge for disposal.
