Convenience wipes such as baby, hygienic, cleaning and disinfectant, as well as toilet bowl scrubbers and even paper towels might be labeled as "disposable or flushable" but these items should not go down the drain. Products like

these do not break down in the sewer system, causing plugs in sewer pipes and pumps, resulting in sewage backups, costly cleanups and environmental consequences that can result in rate increases.

What can YOU do to help?

- Do not flush objects down the toilet such as wipes, diapers, feminine hygiene products, or dental floss.
- Dispose of these items in your household or business trash receptacle.
- Inform those who clean your house or business of proper disposal methods for convenience products.
- Select cleaning supplies that can be washed and reused.

In addition to the above TIER I ODD/EVEN days restriction, watering is prohibited by all properties between the hours of 10:00 am-7:00 pm
